
Important Reminders from the Counseling Department





Among those in our community greatly impacted by Hurricane Ida was teacher and coach Frank Schermerhorn. Frank lost his house and everything in it including all of his clothing during the storm. Frank is an avid collector of sports memorabilia and lost a significant number of jerseys, sweatshirts and other sentimental possessions.



We recently received a call from Officer Anthony Memelo of the Lambertville Police Department. He said that he had a special delivery for Frank and wanted to bring it to the high school. Officer Memelo had gone down to the canal and fished through the silt to recover many of Frank's clothes that were lost in the storm. He took all of the clothes that were dirty and in bad shape and washed them 6 or 7 times. He presented the clothes to Frank in front of some of our students. It was an incredibly kind gesture and Frank was truly overwhelmed with joy. The students helped Frank bring the jerseys out to his



### **COAST 2 COAST 4 CANCER RIDE**

From Ski Lifts to Lifting Up a Friend

Brian Claus first met high school teacher and ski club advisor Dan Ruvolo when his son joined the ski club. Brian volunteered to drive the ski equipment on the weekend trips in his pickup truck to free up space on the bus, and he volunteered as an additional chaperone on a couple of Vermont ski trips.

It was through the ski club that Brian and Dan became friends: The avid skiers shared a mutual love of skiing and had similar goals when it came to giving South Hunterdon students a great experience.

"Dan dedicates a massive amount of time and effort to the club to ensure everyone who participates has a positive experience," Brian said. "His passion for it reminded me of my time in ski club."

Brian's son has since graduated, but the Claus family's connection to South Hunterdon remains strong. This fall, Brian participated in a new physical challenge to honor his dear friend Dan and others affected by cancer. Brian and his colleagues at Bristol Myers Squibb formed cycling teams across the country in the 2021 Coast 2 Coast 4 Cancer Ride to raise money for the V Foundation for Cancer Research, a charitable organization dedicated to achieving Victory Over Cancer® through research.



"It is staggering to see firsthand how many people are affected by cancer and this was an opportunity to go beyond my normal day to day activities and have a broader impact," Brian said. "As devastating as cancer is, it also serves as a common ground for people to communicate around."

Brian and his team rode for three days straight in September, from Rapid City, South Dakota to Sioux City, Iowa, covering a whopping 225 miles or so in the process. While his ride was of course physically challenging, the long and steep hills he took on after five months of training were emblematic of the emotional toll brought on by cancer.

"The riders on the team spent a lot of time together talking about our stories and how cancer has touched us," Brian explained.

When he first volunteered for the ride at the end of 2019, Brian had a lot of personal ties motivating him.

"At that point, both my parents were cancer survivors and Dan was still in his first twelve months since his diagnosis," Brian explained. "Dan's experience was crushing to me as I watched him go from one day being an avid skier looking forward to a day on the mountain to being engaged in the fight of his life."

Having seen his parents go through their experiences first-hand, Brian knew how important it was to support Dan and let him know he wasn't alone in his fight.

With that in mind, Brian wore a different jersey each day on his ride. On the first day, he rode with Dan's name and his mom on his back. On day two, he wore more than a dozen names requested by his donors. The final day of riding, Brian just wore Dan's name, and he will be presenting that Jersey to Dan as a token of support.

"I hope the ride is special for Dan simply as a statement of support from the community as well as an opportunity to use his story to inspire people and raise money to beat cancer." Brian said. For Brian, the most important part of the ride was the fundraising component to support the Jimmy V Foundation. In the time since he signed up to participate, Brian's mom relapsed and passed away, making his journey that much more raw and complex.

"It is difficult to express in words the level of support I received from my teammates," Brian said. "They made the ride unforgettable."

Brian was also touched by the donations he received in support of his goals some from people he knew, others from strangers who wanted to help.

"The South Hunterdon community is an amazing network of people helping other people," Brian said. "Sometimes it is for people very close to them, and sometimes it is for people they barely know, but one thing you can count on is the community always comes together to help each other."

A great example of one of those community helpers is Brian Claus.
